INSIDE THE COTTAGE

IF you take to heart the odd-goal defeats we suffered in each of our two opening games, you are fully entitled to say that we have not started the new campaign very auspiciously.

We went down 3-2 on our own ground to Preston North End in a match which we were fully entitled to win, and we lost again at Tottenham by the only goal when we might have earned a draw. And so, as early as this in the season, we have had another taste of the irritating experience we suffered from so much last term, when quite often we had our chances and our share of the play, but just didn't get the goals that mattered.

Fortunately, we have ample time to make amends for any shortcomings from which we might be suffering, but already the fact is as obvious as it was throughout last season that we have all the talent we need to win matches but are not yet putting it to the best use.

Take the Preston game. How often do you see a team so com-

pletely in control of the opening stages of a match yet come out the losers? In those first twenty minutes we could and should have scored four goals. What is more, we would have deserved them, for from the front line to the back the team moved like a well-oiled machine and there seemed little chance of the Preston defence holding out.

When Jimmy Bowie gave us the lead with a magnificent and richly deserved goal we sat back and waited for the others to follow. Instead the forwards began to lose touch. The ball was not moving about with such precision, and at last the visiting half-backs and inside forwards were able to bring England international Tom Finney right into the game.

Yet the fact remains that it was fully twenty minutes before Preston got a look at our goal, so well were we playing. Bobby Brennan had a couple of goes very early on to show the Fulham mettle, and then Bowie took a hand. It was actually with the fourth shot of the game at the Preston

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goal that the Scotsman gave us the lead, and what a pile-driver it was! Gooch might have saved it had it not been travelling so fast!

Then Johnny Campbell went close, followed by Bedford Jezzard firing across goal and missing by inches. And all this time it was one-way traffic so far as the ball was concerned.

We looked all set to cross over with the lead when, a minute from the interval Beattie put Preston on terms after a Finney juggling performance. Yes, we struck Finney at the top of his form, and that means we had a great player facing us.

Still, our tails were up again within a minute of the restart when Jezzard nodded through straight from an Arthur Stevens corner kick. For the second time we were on top, but this time our lead was shorter lived, for within a minute Finney had presented Horton with a chance he couldn't miss.

By now it was anybody's match. That much was obvious. As a spectacle the game was deteriorating and it wanted a snap goal to settle the issue. It came from Charlie Wayman, the Preston leader, and we do not suppose there were any tears in his eyes when, unattended by Jim Taylor for the first time in the match, he directed the ball into the far corner past his old Southampton club-mate Ian Black.

That was in the 53rd minute, and though the boys tried all they could to get on terms again, the fact is that the craftsmanship that enables five men to use the ball between them to the best advantage was missing.

Brennan had a nasty bump or two and was not fit enough to take his place for the game against the Spurs the following Monday. Bob Thomas came in and, as ever, gave a workmanlike account of himself.

We do not say we deserved a draw at White Hart Lane because, as you know, we take the view that a team which fails to take its chances doesn't deserve any, but we do say with every confidence that as the game went on we OUGHT to have drawn.

Our lads made the openings but just couldn't shoot through them. All through the game the Spurs' defence had as much to do as did our boys, and in fact in the closing stages they were more hard pressed than they or we had ever been.

It just wanted that finishing touch on the part of our forwards to get the ball home, and we contend that once they learn to do that we shall have nothing to fear from any team in the League.

It needed a header from a free kick outside the penalty area to enable the Spurs to get the only goal, and well taken though the opportunity was by Medley, the fact that the winning goal came this way means that we couldn't have been very far behind the Spurs in approach work and defensive play.

Towards the end we made switches in the forward line, and while the same ability to penetrate was there the winding up shot into the net remained absent.

There was no space in our previous issue to tell you anything about what has been going on inside The Cottage during the summer break, but there was not a great deal of activity, anyway. However, some of you may have noticed that levelling work has been carried out down the centre of the pitch, resulting in the rise down the middle being reduced by a few inches.

We have all last season's playing, training and managerial staff with us, and we are very happy to be able to tell you that several of the boys who showed such promising form for us last season have signed professional forms now they are old enough.

You will join us, we know, in wishing each of them every success in the career they have chosen.

We received a request from John McDonald, our reserve left winger, to be placed on the transfer list. Johnny said he felt that there was room in the first eleven for him somewhere, and very reluctantly we had to agree to his request. We've received enquiries about Johnny, but there has been very little activity in the transfer market this summer compared with previous years, and at present at any rate Johnny remains with us, still giving us his wholehearted service.

Incidentally, it was the first time for some years that a Fulham player has asked to be placed on the transfer list, but we see McDonald's point.

Before the season gets too far on its way we want to give Wally Hinchelwood a very hearty welcome back to the fold, a couple of times, but we know he is happy to be back. 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JOE BACUZZI



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IT is nearly sixteen years since Joe Bacuzzi, then a youth who had made a big impression in Tottenham League football playing for Tufnell Park, joined Fulham. It would seem an unfamiliar Fulham team now without this genial, likeable player in it. One of the outstanding features of Fulham's play last

season was the manner in which Joe recaptured his youth and played his part in Fulham's defence. Even crossing to the other flank to make room for Reg. Lowe on the left made no difference. He was still the same imperturbable Joe.

But for one of those strange things that occur every now and then Joe Bacuzzi might have been an Arsenal player. He did, in fact, sign amateur forms for them, but, as in the case of Len Shackleton, his talent was not recognised then, for which Fulham have since been profoundly thankful.

In season 1937-38 Joe Bacuzzi established himself as a regular first team player at Fulham, and save for the war period he has scarcely been out of the League side since. He played in twelve war-time internationals for England; and after the war played for England against France in Paris in May, 1946. It was also an honour for him to be asked by Arsenal to play for their strengthened team, which included Stanley Matthews and Stanley Mortensen, against the famous Russian Dynamos at Tottenham in November, 1945.

Joe is a credit to the game wherever he goes. Those who have seen him play against Stanley Matthews must have been impressed by his sportsmanship. For Joe uses only the fair way to stop an opponent. He was born at Clerkenwell and still lives there.

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WELCOME TO TOTTENHAM HOTSPUR

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OUR old friends and rivals the Spurs visit us this evening as reigning champions of the Football League, and we extend to them a most cordial welcome. The Spurs championship victory last season, the first time ever they had attained this great honour, was as clear-cut as could be. From the start of the season their play had the championship hall-mark, and they maintained their very high standard throughout the campaign. In winning this honour on their return to the First Division, they achieved a performance only Liverpool and Everton had achieved before.

The Spurs were the first Southern professional club to win the F.A. Cup. They beat Sheffield United fifty years ago, at Bolton, after a drawn Final at the Crystal Palace. The Spurs' first Cup Final attracted an attendance at the Palace of over 110,000, and their popularity has not waned. They won the Cup a second time in 1921, when they beat Wolverhampton at Stamford Bridge.

Theirs was a season of sustained brilliance last season, but none of their achievements was so brilliant as their remarkable victory over Newcastle United, ultimate Cup winners, in a League match at Tottenham. The Spurs won a dazzling match by 7-0. The amazing thing about the game was that Newcastle played very well, and yet were swamped by some superlative play by the Spurs. "We shall never come up against anything like this again," Stanley Seymour, director-manager of Newcastle, said after the match.

The Spurs team on that occasion was: Ditchburn; Ramsey, Willis; Nicholson, Clarke, Brittain; Walters, Bennett, Duquemin, Baily, Medley. The goal-scorers were: Medley (3), Bennett, Baily, Walters, Ramsey (penalty).

We have mixed recollections of our two League games with the champions last season. They took place on Good Friday at Craven Cottage, and at Tottenham on Easter Monday. Undoubtedly Fulham gave two of their best displays of the season, particularly in the home game. Yet the Spurs took all four points. They won 1-0 on our ground, and 2-1 on their own. But if we lost the points, we convinced all who saw the two games that we could play football almost as good as that of the new champions.

There are six full internationals in the present Tottenham team. Ditchburn, Ramsey, Nicholson, Baily and Medley have played for England; and Ron Burgess, Spurs' captain, is a regular choice for Wales.

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
